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have a very ugly job on hand, with this Indian war. The Indians on this river are peaceable enough with a great deal of watching and coaxing—they come in here very frequently, and appear to have a great itch for scalping and plundering, and nothing, I imagine, but their concern for the prisoners we have, refirains them from taking up the hatchet.

a A few days ago, feveral chiefs came in from Opee, a place high up on the Illinois river, and, in their speech to Major Hamtramck, told him they were frequently invited and threatened by the Miami Indians to induce them to go to war against us, but that they had not, nor did intend to do it. That we must keep a good heart, for we should have a great many more to fight this year. than we had the laft-withed us fuccefs, and hoped we might give them a good drubbing. The Major enquired whether the British made them any presents—they replied, that the British gave them goods like stacks of hay, provisions, arms, ammunition, and every thing but big guns.

"Indeed, every intelligence we have received from the Miami villages, corroborate fo far as to convince us that there will be double the number of Indians in the field this year, there was the last, and the British continue to supply them with every thing they want; fo that I think a few of us will be apt

to lofe our hair."

Letters from Europe inform us that, exclusive of the large armies of the fecular force that are preparing to attack the freedom of France, and through it the general liberty of mankind, his Holinels the Pope has entered the lift, with all the firength of his spiritual arm, denouncing the u most vengeance on various orders of men; but against no soriety has he been so pointedly severe as that of the Free Mifons, filling them arbeids, bea neus, & & & and that they, moreover, by their pretented philosophy, have inftilled into the minds of the people that spirit of equality, which his Holimels afferes doss not extif in nature

It is mentioned in a letter from Cumberland, that a party of Indians confitting of Creeks, Cherokees, and Shawanele have taken a station about thirty miles from Nathville, in which were about twenty persons, fome of whom they killed, and carried off others prisoners to their towns.

A fhort, tho' curious effey, appears in a New-Hampshire paper, in which the writer boldly afferts, that the whole human race are firictly of the diabolical nature - The are Devils (lays he) but some worle than other jume; foms white, some black, some copper-coloured, &c .- It would be hardly worth while to enter into a a ferious resutation of this author's opinions - Don Quevelo will convince us he is wrong :- "In hell (fays he Don Quevedo) I law no barbers .- The devils will not truff each other to be shaved, for fear of having their weazons out."-Now if on earth there are barbers, it is a firing prefamption that the diabolical nature is not the predominant one.

NORFOLK, August 22. On Friday last arrived in Hampton Roads, the ship George, Silas Daggett, Master, from Cadiz, who informs us, that, on the 25th of June last, arrived at Cadiz the celebrated Indian Chief A. Bowles, who had been lately taken prisoner at New Orleans. He was closs confined in the common gaol. When he was taken to prison he was habited in his Indian tirels, and expressed himself much surprised that Je was not treated as a flate prisoner and carried to the castle. The crowd gathered to see him was to great as to impede his passage to the prifon. He threatened the Spaniards with the revenge of his nation on their American fettlements for the treatment he received. It is expected he will thortly take his trial for the depredations he committed, which will probably coft him bis life.

CHARLESTON, September 3. Died on Sunday morning, at two o'clock, Mordecai Gift, Esq late Brig. Gen. in the army of the United States. Yefferday his remains were deposited in St. Michael's church yard. As Grand Mafter of the Society of Ancient Masons the different Lodges attended in order, as also did the Society of the Cincinnati. Although eulogies have become as common almost as burials, yet (to hand as far as possibe, either as to space or time) this thort fketch of that gentleman's character is offered by one who knew fo much of him as to love and efteem him. At

the beginning of the war between these United States and Great Britain he entered the martial lift, and ferved to the end with honor, credit, and applause. In his private life he was beneficent and courteous. The community at large have sustained a los-his particular friends and acquaintances must regret and lament his death; but as to his discousolate family! O God of Nature, have thou mercy on them! for by his death their lofe has become irreparable.

The landed interest of the union may from these circum lances form an idea, how far it may be prudent for them to part with real property under its intrinsic value; now that they can plainly fee prospects are opening on every fide to highly favorable to, and to far beyond their most fanguine expectations.

Agents are daily expedied from the British West-India islands, to eugage in the feaport towns, and other places of trade, fuita. ble accommodations for the different claffes, who have entered into an affociation for their murual protection and advantage on the prefent emergency.
