CONTRACT for RATIONS.

Savannah, September 4, 1792.

NOTICE is hereby given, That Proposals
will be received at the Customhouse in
this city, until the 15th day of November
next inclusive, for the supply of all rations
which may be required for the use of the Unit-
ed States, from the 1st January to 31st of De-
cember, 1793, both days inclusive, at the
places and within the districts herein after-
mentioned.

At the Post on the River Saint Mary.

At the Post on the River Altamaha.

At the Post on the River Oconee called Fort
Massachusetts.

At the Post at the junction of the north
branch with the main stream of the Oconee.

At any place or places from the Rock-
landing on the Oconee up to the mouth of the
main fourth branch of the said river, from the
said mouth up to the source of the said main
fourth branch, and from thence to the Curabee
mountain.

At any other place or places within the
state of Georgia which may hereafter be occu-
pied as permanent posts by any troops of the
United States

And for rations deliverable on the march to
such future posts.

The rations to be supplied are to consist of
the following articles, viz.

One pound of bread or flour;
One pound of beef, or 3-4 of pound of
pork;

Half a gill of rum, brandy or whisky;
One quart of salt,
Two quarts of vinegar,
Two pounds of soap,
One pound of candles,

The rations are to be furnished in such
quantities as that there shall at all times, dur-
ing the said term, be sufficient for the con-
sumption of the troops at each of the said posts,
for the space of at least two months in ad-
vance, in good and wholesome provisions.

It is to be understood that all losses sustain-
ed by the depredations of the enemy, or by
means of the troops of the United States,
shall be paid for at the prices of the articles
captured or destroyed, on the deposition of
two or more creditable characters, and the
certificate of a commissioned officer, ascertain-
ing the circumstances of the loss, and amount
of the articles for which compensation is
claimed.

The contract for the above supplies will be
made either for one year or for two years, as
may appear eligible. Persons disposed to
contract will therefore confine their offers
to one year, or they may make their propo-
sitions so as to admit an election of the term
of two years.

The proposals must specify the lowest price
per ration for prompt payment, and must be
made for the whole of the above posts.

Proposals will also be received at the Cus-
tomhouse, until the 20th day of October next
inclusive, for the supply of all rations which
may be required for the Revenue Cutter on
the Georgia station, from the 15th of Novem-
ber, 1792, to the 31st of December, 1793,
both days inclusive, which will also specify
the lowest price per ration for prompt pay-
ment. The rations to be supplied are to con-
sist of the same as are above mentioned.
